# Employer, training provider and project winners

[Seven organisations and projects](#) from Cairns to the Southern Gold Coast have been recognised for their contributions to vocational education and training.

Clarke Diesel and CaPTA Group, both in Cairns, were named Small and Large Employer of the Year respectively. While the Currumbin Wildlife Sanctuary took out the Medium Employer of the Year award.

The Darling Downs and South West region had a strong showing as well, with Dalby Welcoming Community's Building Connections to Employment through Dalby's Delicious and DeLIGHTful Festival winning Community Training Initiative of the Year. Also in the winners circle was Small Training Provider of the Year Harness Energy which has offices in Toowoomba and Chinchilla as well as Brisbane.

TAFE Queensland won Large Training Provider of the Year and was also part of the Premier's Industry Collaboration Award winner. That went to the Queensland Future Skills Partnership, which has BHP Mitsubishi Alliance, CQUniversity Australia and TAFE Queensland working together to fast-track the development and delivery of automated technology training pathways for the open-cut mining industry.
