Offender profile

3309 young people had at least one proven offence

70% Male

- 55% Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander
- 68% Re-offended within 12 months^b
- 483 Serious repeat offenders on an average day
- 56 Serious repeat offender declarations as at 31 March 2024

Complexity of young offenders (Census 2023)

- 81% have used at least one substance
- 38% in youth justice custody^e have used ice or other methamphetamines
- **53%** have experienced or been impacted by domestic and family violence
- **44%** have a mental health and/or behavioural disorder (diagnosed or suspected)
- **48%** are disengaged from education, training or employment
- 25% have at least one parent who spent time in adult custody
- **30%** in unstable and/or unsuitable accommodation
- **44%** have a disability (assessed or suspected)

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander

representation: Compared to non-Indigenous young people, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander young people were:

- **14 x** as likely to have a proven offence
- **22 x** as likely to receive a supervised order
- **27 x** as likely to be held in Youth Justice custody
- 26 x as likely to be on remand
